#### STATEMENT OF DEFENCE AND CROSSCLAIM OF THE DEFENDANT, THE INCORPORATED SYNOD OF THE DIOCESE OF ONTARIO

- 1. The Incorporated Synod of the Diocese of Ontario ("Diocese") admits the allegations contained in paragraphs 8, 14 and 15 of the <u>Amended Amended Statement of Claim but except</u> as hereinafter expressly admits, denies each and every other allegation contained therein.
- 2. The Diocese specifically denies the allegations contained in paragraphs 7, 9, 18, 21, 22, 26, 27 through 35 inclusive (as alleged against the Diocese), 42, and 43 through 51 inclusive, and puts the Plaintiffs to strict proof thereof.
- 3. The Diocese has no knowledge of the allegations contained in paragraphs 2 through 6 inclusive, 12, 13, 16, 17, 19, 20, 23 through 25, and 36 through 41 inclusive and puts the Plaintiffs to strict proof thereof.

- 4. The Diocese of Ontario admits the allegation in paragraphs 10 and 11 that J. Alastair Haig ("Haig") and Charles Farnsworth ("Farnsworth") were both ordered deacons in June 1977 and ordained as priests on September 29, 1977, but at no material time did the Diocese grant either Haig or Farnsworth license to act as a parish priest. The Diocese has no knowledge as to the balance of the allegations contained in paragraphs 10 and 11 and puts the plaintiffs to the strict proof thereof.
- 5. The Diocese is responsible for the administration of the churches within its jurisdiction.

  The Diocese is not responsible for the general activities of Anglicans or Anglican Priests who operate outside the scope and authority of a defined parish.
- 6. The Diocese of Ontario played no role or involvement in, nor was it consulted about the establishment of Grenville Christian College ("the College"), nor was it involved in any way in the promotion, staffing or administration of the College. The Diocese was not responsible for or associated with the College. The Diocese expressly denies any and all allegations that it at any time was responsible for, involved in, or associated with the administration, running or supervision of the College and further denies any affiliation, formal or informal, or any association with the College at any material time.
- 7. The Diocese had no jurisdiction nor responsibility for the supervision, guidance or control over either Haig or Farnsworth as members of the community, teachers or instructors at the College, or officers, directors or head masters at the College and had no role in, control or authority respecting the nature or substance of the religious instruction provided to students at the College nor did the Diocese supervise or was expected to or requested to provide supervision, guidance or advice to the College.

- 8. In the alternative, to the extent there could be any finding that the Diocese had some involvement in the supervision, control or guidance of Haig or Farnsworth for any of the allegations in this claim, which is denied, it could not be any earlier than their ordination date of September 29, 1977.
- 9. The Diocese denies that Haig and Farnsworth were not suitable by education, training and experience to enter the priesthood. Prior to his ordination, Alastair Haig was an ordained minister with the United Church and was a university graduate with a Divinity degree. Charles Farnsworth studied at the University of Georgia and Georgia State College as well as a bible research foundation in Atlanta, Georgia. He was ordained as a minister in 1960 in Atlanta, Georgia and was a pastor of a community in Georgia, and Texas thereafter. The Diocese pleads and the fact is that both Haig and Farnsworth were ordained as priests in accordance with practices, policies and procedures of the Anglican Church, and met the requirements for ordination.
- 10. In any event, the Diocese pleads that the mere fact Haig and Farnsworth were ordained priests did not place the Diocese in control of their actions, the school, the teachings at the school or the religious services held there.
- 11. The Diocese pleads that from time to time, the Bishop and/or other members of the Diocese were invited by the school to attend at certain ceremonics, such as graduation, but denies any or all allegations regarding regular attendance or visits apart from those extended by a specific invitation from the College.
- 12. The Diocese denies the existence of a duty of care or of a fiduciary relationship with the College staff or students and as such, denies all allegations respecting a duty of care or fiduciary

duty owed to the plaintiffs. In the alternative, if such duty existed, the Diocese denies that it breached such duties.

- 13. The Diocese further denies the application of the doctrine of vicarious liability and in particular, pleads that the College was an independent private school, operated by a corporation with its own separate Board of Directors, which supervised, hired and directed all activities at the School. The Diocese denies that Haig and Farnsworth, and any or all headmasters, teachers and staff at the school, were at any time under the control, authority or supervision of the Diocese.
- 14. The Diocese further denies that it knew or ought to have known of the alleged acts now complained of and/or the possible effects that they may have upon the plaintiffs as alleged and puts the plaintiffs to strict proof thereof.
- 15. The Diocese denies the plaintiffs sustained damages as alleged and further pleads that if any damages, injuries or losses were sustained, same arise from factors and events unrelated to any acts or omissions of the Diocese and/or were caused or contributed to by factors and events which occurred prior to and subsequent to their attendance at Grenville College. The Diocese further denies that the plaintiffs' attendance at Grenville caused, aggravated, influenced or otherwise contributed to these pre-existing or subsequent injures, losses, illnesses, accidents, diseases or damages.
- 16. The Diocese pleads that the plaintiffs' claims are excessive and too remote or unforeseen and that the plaintiffs have failed to mitigate same.
- 17. The Diocese pleads and relies upon the Negligence Act, R.S.O. 1990, c.N.1 as amended.

- 18. The Diocese pleads that some or all of the acts complained are barred by virtue of the passage of time and pleads and relies upon:
  - (i) The *Limitations Act*, R.S.O. 1990, c.P.3, s. 7;
  - (ii) The Limitations Act, R.S.O. 1970, c. 246;
  - (iii) The Limitations Act, R.S.O. 1980, c. 240;
  - (iv) The *Limitations Act*, R.S.O. 1990, c.L.15, s. 45;
  - (v) The Limitations Act, R.S.O. 2002, c.L.24, including sections 4, 5 and 24(3).
- 19. The Diocese pleads and the fact is the plaintiffs failed to commence their claims on a timely basis or at all prior to the expiration of the limitation period despite having knowledge of all the material facts and the consequences and impact upon each plaintiff as now alleged prior to expiration of this applicable limitation period. Accordingly the claim as against the Diocese is barred.
- 20. The Diocese further pleads that the plaintiffs are not entitled to pursue this claim and/or prejudgment interest and/or costs by reason of the delay and laches in pursuing this claim.
- 21. The Diocese pleads and relies upon the provisions of the Class Proceedings Act, S.O. 1992, c.6 as amended and further pleads that pursuant to the requirements of section 5, this is not a proper case for class certification as each allegation of abuse respecting each individual and the alleged damages arising therefrom are unique, do not constitute common issue and require individual evidence and trial and accordingly neither liability nor can damages be determined as an aggregate.

- 22. The circumstances alleged, if proven, are not such as to give rise to liability for punitive, exemplary, or aggravated damages. Further, the particulars giving rise to such damages have been insufficiently pleaded and lack necessary particulars.
- 23. The Diocese respectfully requests that this action be dismissed as against it with costs on a substantial indemnity basis.

#### **CROSSCLAIM**

- 24. The Diocese of Ontario claims as against Grenville Christian College, Charles Farnsworth, and J. Alastair Haig for:
  - (i) contribution and indemnity;
  - (ii) costs of defence of the main action and costs of this crossclaim;
  - (iii) G.S.T., H.S.T. and interest on the above amounts pursuant to the *Courts of Justice*Act;
  - (iv) such further and other relief as this Honourable Court deems just.
- 25. The Diocese repeats and adopts the allegations contained in the Statement of Defence herein.
- 26. The Diocese repeats and adopts the allegations of negligence and breach of fiduciary duty made as against its co-defendants in the <u>Amended Amended Statement of Claim herein</u>.
- 27. The Diocese pleads and relies upon the provisions of the *Negligence Act*, R.S.O. 1990, c.M.1 herein.
